Society News

The newsletter

As reported in issues 341 & 342, the society's newsletter will be sent out in e-mail form after October 2017, when subscriptions are due. Members who wish to receive a paper copy of the newsletter will have to <u>opt in</u> to the postal system, which will cost an **additional £8** per year. The committee has taken the decision to end the hand delivery system, which is very labour intensive, because of rising costs. For some time now, all new members have had only the e-mail option, & the 2017/18 membership forms will reflect the new system.

Please note that the AGM issue in September will be the last newsletter to be delivered under the current arrangement. If you wish to receive the newsletter by post, you will need to complete the postal option form and make the extra payment of £8 in addition to your subscription. The postal option form will be in issue 344 in the autumn and will also be available on the society's website at the same time. For those members who pay by standing order and wish to receive a paper copy, please ensure that you amend your SO from 1 October 2017.

N.B. The hand delivery system will cease after the AGM issue in September and the new postal option is an opt-in system.

Fred Waldron worked for Pilkington's in St Helen's for many years, & also for the Ford motor company in Detroit, but his innovative genius is largely unknown. Thursday 13th July: Dr Andrew Zsigmond, The Hungarian Revolution of 1956 & my subsequent escape

Dr Andrew Zsigmond will be talking of his escape from Hungary in 1956, & his eventual arrival in England. Dr Zsigmond is a local resident & a member of the Woolton Society. He was also the founder of The Rodney Street Association.

This is another innovation for the Woolton Society: an afternoon talk in the Simon Peter Centre on Church Road. We realise that many members would appreciate a daytime talk, & also that some

The talks in September & October, as well as the AGM in November will be at the Village Club, beginning at 7.30pm.

Environment, Planning News & Applications

Public Right of Way, Glenacres/Byron Court Update

On 20th June the city council submitted all the documentation to the Secretary of State for the Environment Food & Rural Affairs, who is responsible for determining disputed Public Right of Way The Planning inspectorate will now have to decide whether to invite further written representations, or to arrange a local hearing/public enquiry. We understand that it is likely to be a further 27 to 35 weeks before the final verdict on the PRoW claim is announced.

Resurfacing of Church Road

Residents of Church Road received a letter recently informing them that the policy of patching the individual craters in the road surface will end, & that the road will be entirely resurfaced during the current financial year. This is excellent news for residents, as the road has been deteriorating for years while nearby Quarry Street & Reservoir Road, which do not carry as much traffic, or a bus route, were resurfaced some time ago.

Woolton in Bloom

The hanging baskets have now been put in place in the village, & summer planting is completed with a magnificent display depicting Sergeant Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club band on the grass near the Derby Arms. The calendar for 2018 will be available soon, with a Beatles theme.

There will be a Yellow Book open gardens event on **Saturday 8th July**, with four gardens open to the public which have previously been open under the Woolton in Bloom scheme. The gardens are 71 Manor Road, 10 Acrefield Park, 16 Layton Close & the Marie Curie Centre, all open from 12 noon to 5pm with a combined admission of £4. All proceeds go to the Yellow Book charities, not to WIB.

Womens Institute

There are now two WIs in Woolton, both very popular. The first to be established, *Women of Woolton* (WOW) meets on the first Tuesday of the month at The Quarry in the village centre. It has a varied programme of talks & walks, bowls & golf, line dancing & Tai Chi, & a very successful quiz team.

The newly formed *Woolton Wanderers* meet in the Simon Peter Centre on Church Road on the third Monday of the month. They are establishing a busy programme, with fuller details to follow in our next issue. Both groups are now full, & cannot accept new members, but visitors may attend one meeting for a small charge.

Friends of Reynolds Park

The Friends have recently bought fertiliser & canes for the dahlia displays in the walled garden, as there had not been the funds to supply them as well as the flowers. One hundred new stakes have been bought.

The Liverpool Network Theatre Group, in association with The Wanderlust Theatre Company will be performing Shakespeare's *The Taming of the Shrew* in Reynolds Park. The dates are **Saturday 15**th & **Sunday 16**th **July**, both at 2pm. Tickets are priced at £9, or £8 concessions, & will be available on the gate.

There will also be an opportunity to buy five English wild daffodil bulbs for £1, to be planted in the wild flower meadow, & a further five for £1 to take home. This must be the bargain of the year! 9th September is also Heritage Open Day.

FORP meetings are held in the coffee shop at Tesco at 7pm. All are welcome to attend. The next meetings will be on **July 12**th, **September 9**th & **November 8**th.

Beatles Festival at St Peter's

St Peter's will be celebrating the 60th anniversary of when John Lennon met Paul McCartney at the Woolton Fete in July 1957. There is a full programme of events, with activities every day from **July**

5th **to 9**th. The hall will be open every day from 10am to 3pm, & 12.30 to 4pm on Sunday. Many local groups, including the Woolton Society, will be taking part. Bishop Martin School will be re-creating the fete of 1957 on their field on **Thursday 6**th **July**.

A play will be performed in a marquee on the Bishop Martin field on **Saturday 8th July**, entitled *Walls & Bridges*. This tells the story of a day in the life of John Lennon in the summer of 1974 when he was going through his lost weekend. Performances will be at 3pm & 7.30pm, tickets £12 in advance, or £15 on the door.

The Woolton Wireless Wizard: an update

Issue 341of the newsletter reported the story of radio pioneer Edgar Menzies who invented the police wireless system in the 1930s, & transmitted from his home in Linkstor Road. An update in issue 342 told of help offered by a former police officer who advised the family of Mr Menzies in approaching the relevant authorities about a blue plaque on the house.

We have been contacted recently by Dot Holden the daughter of Edgar Menzies, who reports that she has had very constructive conversations with the Assistant Chief Constable about recognition of her father's work, & a blue plaque may well be placed soon on 38 Linkstor Road. It will carry the police insignia &, she hopes, the words *The Woolton Wireless Wizard*.

The Woolton Society has been invited to the installation, when it takes place, & a full report will follow.
